Week of Prayer

We were blessed by Pastor Byard Parks leading out in our week of spiritual emphasis this past week. He and his family currently live in Lincoln, NE, but they spent ten years serving as missionaries in Turkey. This was an undercover ministry as proselytizing in Turkey is against the law. He shared many wonderful experiences of how God has led and is leading.

On **Monday**, he talked with the students about honor. He shared some rose water with each student as this is a way Turkish hosts honor their guests. He talked about what honor means—to show deference, obedience, thankfulness, respect. Through the story of the prodigal son he showed how God would have us show honor to Him—by loving those He loves. On **Tuesday**,

Pastor Parks showed the students currency from 12 countries (of the 70 he's been to) and then asked the students what the currency of heaven is. It's love! He told

stories of how love grows in ones heart as one gives love away. On **Wednesday**, Pastor Byard talked about belonging—that each of us has a place in heaven with God where He wants to live with us forever. At the printing of this newsletter, we have not yet heard the Thursday message, but we have been blessed and want to extend our hearty thanks to Pastor Byard for making the long trip to spend the week with us on Invitation Hill.


Dress Code Addition


Blankets for Babies

When the hospital personnel placed the little one in her parents' arms after she died, she was wrapped in a handmade little blanket. This gesture meant so much to the grieving mother that she began a mission to make blankets for families that face similar situations. She called it, "Breelyn's Blanket Brigade." So, we are going to learn to make crochet so we can help with this project. Each student should bring \$5-

\$10 which we will use to buy a crochet hook for each student and a skein of yarn OR you may take your child shopping to get those items. If you do go shopping, please get a crochet hook that is size J. We would like to purchase yarn that is extra soft—like Lion brand Jamie yarn.
